Frosh Print 'Dialogue'

A new publication made an unexpected appearance at the University yesterday as 1500 copies of a five-page mimeographed magazine named "Dialogue" appeared in several places around the campus.

Edited by Kenneth B. Rubin and Daniel I. Schechter, both '64, the first edition was, as its nameplate said, "Published independently by Cornell students." Feature articles were written by Prof. Edward W. Fox of the Department of History, Prof. Andrew Hacker of the Department of Government, Paul Varzell '63 and Editor Rubin.

No plans have yet been made for a second edition, and the editors have not yet approached the Scheduling Committee and Activities Review Board for recognition. The \$20 cost of the first edition was paid by the editors and other interested students.

Dialogue is the outgrowth of an idea born at a CURW freshman dinner at which Prof. Stuart M. Brown Jr., chairman of the Department of Philosophy, deplored the lack of involvement felt by American collegians with respect to national affairs.

The magazine pledges in its lead editorial "a serious attempt to stimulate a free clash of opinion and a concern for discussion. It will offer a medium for thought of all persuasions, from the faculty, from public figures, and most importantly from the students."
